In diesem Seminar beschäftigen wir uns mit den wichtigsten Ereignissen der vergangenen 100 Jahre. Neben Texten und historischen Fotos können wir auch mit Videos in die Vergangenheit eintauchen und dabei feststellen, wie vergangene Ereignisse auch in der jetzigen Zeit noch präsent sind. So führt die Auseinandersetzung mit der Geschichte zu einem besseren Verständnis dafür, was heute geschieht. Schließlich werden wir auch auf die Geschichte Freiburgs eingehen.

Die Geschichte des deutschen Films (B1/B2)

Der deutsche Film ist geprägt von verschiedenen Epochen und Strömungen, die seine Entwicklung maßgeblich beeinflusst haben. Von den expressionistischen Meisterwerken der 1920er Jahre über die Propagandafilme des Dritten Reiches, das Kino der Nachkriegszeit und den Neuen Deutschen Film der 1960er bis 1980er Jahre bis hin zur Vielfalt heutiger Filmproduktionen hat sich der deutsche Film stetig weiterentwickelt. Dabei spiegeln die Filme nicht nur die gesellschaftlichen und politischen Entwicklungen wider, sondern präg(t)en diese auch maßgeblich mit. Die Geschichte des deutschen Films ist somit ein faszinierendes Spiegelbild der deutschen Kultur und Geschichte.

Anhand ausgewählter Filme werden die einzelnen Filmepochen dargestellt und mit exemplarischen Filmausschnitten unterlegt und analysiert.

Wirtschaftsstandort Deutschland, Ökostadt Freiburg (B2/C1)

Die deutsche Wirtschaft gilt als eine der leistungsstärksten der Welt. Das Erfolgsmodell der sozialen Marktwirtschaft sicherte dem Land Jahrzehntelang Stabilität und Wohlstand. Heute steht die deutsche Wirtschaft vor nie dagewesenen Herausforderungen – eine veränderte geopolitische Situation, der Klimawandel, Turbulenzen im Finanzsystem, demografischer Wandel, Migration – die sie zeitweilig sogar in die Rezession rutschen ließen.

In diesem Spannungsfeld zwischen erfolgreicher Vergangenheit und ungewisser Zukunft steht der Kurs „Wirtschaftsstandort Deutschland“. Nach einer Bestandsaufnahme zur konjunkturellen Lage Deutschlands erfolgt ein historischer Rückblick auf die Wirtschaft der Nachkriegszeit, das Wirtschaftswunder, die deutsche Teilung mit der Entwicklung der sozialen Marktwirtschaft auf der einen und der sozialistischen Planwirtschaft auf der anderen Seite und schließlich die Wiedervereinigung.

Im Hauptteil des Seminars geht es um die Frage, wie die deutsche Wirtschaft versucht, den neuen Herausforderungen gerecht zu werden, wobei der Umbau der sozialen zu einer sozial-ökologischen Marktwirtschaft im Mittelpunkt steht. Konkret behandelt werden Themen wie Fachkräftemangel, Energiepolitik, Mobilität, Modernisierung der Infrastruktur, Digitalisierung und Künstliche Intelligenz sowie soziale Fragen wie das Bürgergeld, eine generationengerechte Rentenpolitik oder die Ansprüche der Generation Z in der Arbeitswelt.

Besondere Aufmerksamkeit wird in diesem Kurs der Green City Freiburg gewidmet, die beim ökologischen Umbau der Wirtschaft schon seit langem eine Vorreiterrolle spielt.

Germany at the Heart of Europe: Historical Legacy, European Unity and Global Challenges

This introductory talk sets out to cover some basics of Germany's and Europe's history. It will familiarize you with important dates, figures, places. It will reflect on Germany's position within the EU and the wider global context, and it intends to address some of the geo-political challenges that lie ahead.

This lecture explores one of the most significant technological breakthroughs of 15th century: the invention of the printing press. Originating in the Upper Rhine region during the transitional period between the Middle Ages and the early Renaissance, the printing press revolutionised the production, preservation, and distribution of knowledge for centuries to come. Learn more about its origins, early development, and rapid expansion across Europe and its impact on education, religion, and society at large. By tracing its journey, discover how this innovation laid the foundation for the modern world.

Crafting Tradition and Innovation: the Evolution of Enterprises in the Black Forest

The Romans called the region Silva Nigra - “Black Forest”. Once vast and impassable, the woods became a vital resource as Europe’s demand for timber grew. Traditional crafts like carving and spinning evolved into renowned industries such as clock-making, glassblowing, and precision engineering. “Made im Schwarzwald” came to signify quality. Though some branches declined with globalisation, innovative technology remains a key part of the region’s economy and identity.


22 August
